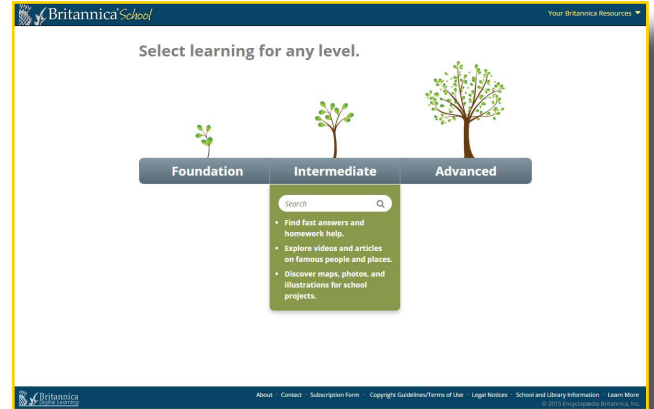


1. Landing page

- Three database levels make it easy to search at an age-appropriate level – Intermediate for lower secondary school users and Advanced for upper-secondary users.
- As you type, Britannica will recommend articles and show popular searches.

 - Interactive study sources

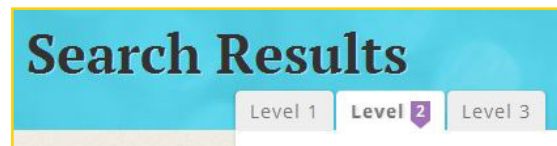
3. Also available on the Intermediate & Advanced levels:

4. Search results page

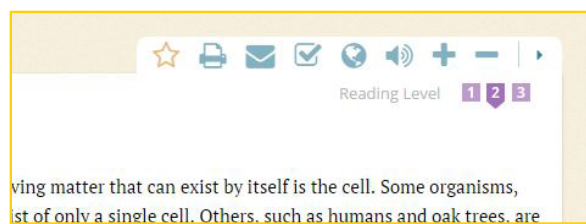
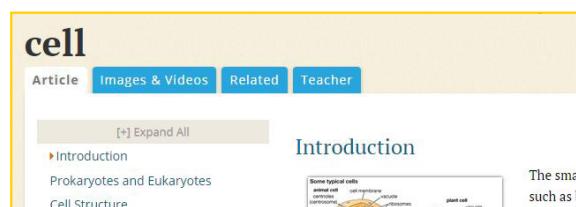
- Tabs at the top allow users to switch between the three content levels to find the content that is reading-age appropriate.



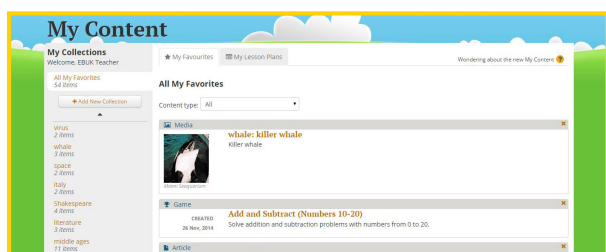
- Content choices down the left include multimedia, academic journals, primary sources and recommended websites.

5. Intermediate/Advanced Article page

- The Table of Contents uses a hyperlinking system to move you through the article.
- Above the Table of Contents are the related materials tabs – related multimedia and also editor-selected related articles.
- The Toolbox is on the right hand side – simply mouse over any tool to find out more! This includes the easy citations, printing options, read-aloud and translation tools.



- The reading levels appear right below the toolbox and, again, you can switch between the three reading levels to find the content that is at the level best for each user.
- Double click on any word to get a dictionary definition.
